Ken Foxe is a DIT lecturer and freelance reporter. He is the author of *Snouts in the Trough: Politicians & Their Expenses*. He specialise in Freedom of Information and data journalism, and is an Advisor at Right to Know, an Irish campaign group on transparency.

Leslie Ann Horgan is the Editor of *Weekend* magazine at the *Irish Independent*, Ireland's biggest-selling magazine in the daily market. Prior to taking on that role in 2014, she worked at the *Irish Daily Mail* where she held the position of Assistant Editor, working across the newspaper's suite of features products as well contributing as a columnist, features writer and reviewer.

Jillian Bolger is a freelance editor and award-winning journalist specialising in features writing, especially food and travel. A regular contributor to *The Irish Independent Weekend* magazine, *Sunday Business Post* magazine, *Image, Food & Wine* and *Image Interiors*, she has written for everyone from *The Irish Times* to *Forbes* in the US. A former columnist with *The Herald*, Jillian has been editor of numerous national glossies, including *Irish Brides*, a role she's held since 2006.

Gerard Cunningham has worked as a freelance journalist and author for 15 years, most recently covering the Charleton tribunal. He contributes a regular media column to *Village* magazine.

Liam Cahill is a writer and historian. He has many years' experience as a journalist – freelance, television, radio (international, national and local), print, web, blogging, social media and best-selling author. He also has extensive experience as a communications and political adviser to large and small businesses, grassroots campaigns, as well as to public representatives and governments across the political spectrum.

Kieran Fagan is a freelance journalist and media consultant. Previously he worked for the *Irish Times*, *Irish Independent* and *Sunday Tribune*, and for Carr Communications. He is currently treasurer of Dublin Freelance branch of the National Union of Journalists.

Rossa McMahon is a solicitor and notary public. He has a training and background in corporate law, particularly data protection, intellectual privacy and government contracts as well as regulated industries. He joined PG McMahon in 2009 as a general practitioner but continues to advise and act in the areas of data protection and intellectual property. He was awarded Munster Solicitor of the Year at the Irish Law Awards 2017 and blogs at aclatterofthelaw.com. He also started a freedom of information and data protection podcast at adventuresininformation.com.

Jason Walsh is a foreign correspondent based in Paris. Formerly the Ireland correspondent of *The Christian Science Monitor* (CSM), he now reports from Ireland, France and Spain for *The New European* (London), *The Straits Times* (Singapore), the CSM and others. He holds a PhD in philosophy from UCD, and his book on epistemology and the news will be published in early 2018 by Imprint Academic.

Lyra McKee is a freelance journalist from Belfast. She is an editor for *Mediagazer* and a former Sky News young journalist of the year, and has been nominated for a GALAS journalist of the year award.

Bernie Ni Fhlatharta is a freelance journalist in print and radio after a 37 year career in print media in regional newspapers. As a native Irish speaker she appreciates she has more options as a bilingual journalist. She's astounded at the shortage of news/court reporters in the regions and believes more young journalists should concentrate on those shifts to get established.

Claire Grady has worked as a journalist for more than 30 years. She started her career as a news reporter, worked on the *Irish independent* newsdesk, commissioned columnists and commentators as opinion editor in the *Evening Herald*, and was editor of the *Evening Herald* (2012-13) and the *Irish Independent* (2013-14).

Michael Roddy worked as a journalist for more than 40 years, starting with newspapers in the suburbs north of New York City. He worked for the Associated Press in Philadelphia and New York before moving to Reuters in the late 1980s. He was a correspondent for Reuters in West Africa, the Middle East, Hungary and Ireland and his last job was covering the European entertainment and arts scene from London.
